Classic Album Rewind


Remembering "Banana Wind"

 ${\cal J}$ have to admit that I was not always a Buffett fan, but all I

had ever heard was Cheeseburger and Margaritaville. In 1997, I bought a boat and started spending time in marinas. As anyone who's been to a marina can attest, you hear a lot of Buffett coming from the boats. The more I heard, the better I liked his music. Of course, the first album I bought was "Songs You Know By Heart." That's probably true of the majority of his fans, at least after 1985. "Banana Wind" was the first of Buffett's studio albums that I bought. It's his 21st studio album and it was released in June of 1996, one year after "Barometer Soup." It peaked at #4 on the Billboard chart and has since been certified platinum.



The album contains thirteen tracks, including the "hidden" track, and does a great job of taking the listener to the islands to feel the warm breeze on your skin. The title track is an instrumental that makes me think of island drinks and sandy beaches, and is always a mood enhancer for me. "Jamaica Mistaica" tells the true story of Buffett getting shot at in Jamaica when his plane was mistaken for a drug running plane. It's become one of my favorite Buffett songs. On "Overkill," Jimmy takes a shot at the music and film industries, and the song has a nice blend of horns and steel drum. "Desdemona's Building A Rocket Ship" further explores a character from one of his novels, "Where is Joe Merchant." Since I haven't read that one, I can't explain the song, but I like it anyway. Desdemona's also mentioned in "Fruitcakes," which leads me to believe that Jimmy's based her character on a real person he's known. Almost all of the songs give you a slow breezy, feeling but "False Echoes" is a serious piece, written about Jimmy's father and his struggle with Alzheimer's disease. The song is over nine minutes long (although listed at 15:54 because of the hidden track) and shows just how good a songwriter Buffett can be when he puts his mind to it. "Tree Top Flyer," the hidden track, is a Stephen Stills song that seems a good fit for Buffet and his Frank Bama persona from his books and TV appearances.

All-in-all, I think "Banana Wind" is one of the better Buffett studio albums. It has a true Caribbean feel and some of the most clever lyrics he's written. If you close your eyes, you can almost hear the wind blowing through the palm trees, while you lie in the tropical sun with a margarita in your hand.

You might just be the person who gives me the gift of having my father walk me down the aisle on my wedding day!

My father is the greatest man I have ever met. He would pick me up and throw me through the air at the pool when I was little. I'd catch my breath and swim right back over begging for him to do it again. When we went on family vacations, he'd be up at 3 A.M. ready to hit the road. The van was all packed and, like a child, he just couldn't wait to get to the beach. And, no matter when I call him, he is always there with the right directions to get me around construction on the highway. He sings... loudly. He raises his voice when he debates my silly liberal point of view. And once, for my birthday, we got tickets to an Eagles game and we had to walk DOWN to find our seats! He knew what that meant to me and just smiled as I cried during the kick-off. There is no mistaking that Bill Wharton means business as he

takes the stage and lets out his Florida swamp scream that raises the hair on the back of your neck. He is not Bill on stage; he becomes the Sauce Boss. Jimmy Buffett sings about him in *I Will Play for Gumbo*:

The sauce boss does his cookin' on the stage,
Stirrin' and a singing for his nightly wage.
Sweating and frettin' from his head to his toe,
Playin' and swayin' with the gumbo
Prayin' and buffetin' with the gumbo

We caught up with the gumbo cooking, slide guitar playing, blues singer and song writer recently and put a number of questions to him:

PP: How does the Sauce Boss fit in with the Parrot Heads?

BW: He came to see us one time and it was pretty cool. We were playing at Margaritaville in New Orleans and he and Michael Utley and a bunch of fellows from Margaritaville Records came in. I had no idea they were there. We had a great first set. I'm liking the New Orleans thing, everyone is really into the music. So, we finish the set and the whole group started

coming towards the stage and they got elbowed out by a covey of young, Sauce Boss autograph seeking women. After all of that calmed down, Jimmy finally came up and said "Hey Boss." I said kind of shaking, "Hey, hey Boss." Then he said "This is the best bar band I have heard in a long time." I asked, "Can I quote you on that?" Jimmy said that everyone wants to be him, but then he said, "I would rather open up a bait store and be you." That's a direct quote! Gives you a little perspective doesn't it? It's a lot of work being Jimmy Buffett, and he does an amazing job at it.

PP: You've got incredible energy.

BW: It's like a living, breathing thing. Like Jimmy, I feed off of the crowd. It's not just me up there, it's everyone, and it all works together – we're all doing this together. It's a thing that you feed. It's a lot like sour dough. I've been cooking with sour dough lately. You've got to have the Mother. Oh, I've got the Mother!

PP: How many shows do you do a year now?

BW: Over 100. I really don't even know.

PP: Do you have a favorite type of event to do?

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BW: I like different events for different reasons. I adore a big crowd! We have played every conceivable event. We've done the Roman Amphitheatre in the South of France. A laundromat in Tallahassee, Florida. We haven't been back to Paris in a long time. The Blues aren't what they used to be in the 90's. It was big back then. I've been playing Margaritaville for over 20 years. And in Key West, the Green Parrot was always my local bar after I got done playing in Margaritaville. There was a time when my money was no good anywhere on the Island (everything was free). I would end up at the Parrot at like, 4am, after wandering around the graveyard somewhere – man, I'm glad those days are gone. It's hard living. It's physically exhausting. But I have no plans on slowing down now.

PP: You have been married 46 years. How do you manage that with all the travel?


BW: Ruth goes with me; New York City, Key West, Paris... In the dead of winter, Rust Belt Tour, she stays home.

PP: You have been playing music for a long time. What would you be doing if you hadn't gone down this path?

BW: Well, I went to school and got a degree in English Education from Florida State University. I was certified to teach English. However, I never got a gig because I was always playing music. I came from a teaching family so I thought I could do it.

PP: Did you ever see any classroom time?


BW: I did some substitute teaching, but I was a bit radical for the system at the time. I was a little too free style. But I still feel like a teacher. Whether it's making gumbo, or playing guitar, or spinning a tale on stage, it's just me. It's poetry in the parking lot.


