Parrot Daze Charity Info

If you're like me, you may be marginally aware of Prospectus Berco without being able to give any kind of clear explanation of what they do. So I decided to find out and then report to you.

According to their website, Prospectus Berco is "dedicated to inspiring people with disabilities or other special needs to lead meaningful lives by providing innovative services that promote dignity and respect." A wonderful mission statement, but not enough information to assuage my insatiable curiosity. I contacted Susan Stalnecker, Director of Development for Prospectus Berco and asked for a tour.

Susan met me at the door and explained that there are two types of programs – day service and residential. Day service is located at the Reading headquarters and includes a vocational workshop employing approximately 120 people. Also at the site are eight classrooms, encompassing an adult training program, again with approximately 120 participants. The residential program includes 28 community homes in Berks, foster care services, LifeSharing and family support services. LifeSharing matches adults with an intellectual disability with local families wishing to share their home. Family support services provide assistance to families with an individual still living within the family home.

If, like me, you envision mentally challenged individuals sitting around a table doing busy work you'd be surprised. At first I saw tables set up in a U-shape, with individuals doing piece work and chatting amiably, but then my nose picked up the unmistakable odor of shrink wrapping, and I discovered Prospectus Berco has a shrink wrap and a blister pack machine. And the work they do is contracted. The organization's marketing department works hard to secure contracts with companies all over the country – including Berks companies. They have contracts with Herr's, Traypak, Sheerlund, and Reading Eagle Company. And they perform government work through JPC.

What really caught my eye that day were the stacks of little baking cups, aka cupcake papers, in all kinds of colors. The baking cups, manufactured in Sweden from spruce pulp with no chemical additive or any foreign substance, are packaged by workers at Prospectus Berco by the millions, and marketed all over the U.S. I loved it. It's a green initiative, it provides Americans with jobs, it stimulates the economy, and it involves food. Well, that last one is personal – I never met a cupcake I didn't like.

Moving from the factory to the adult classroom area, Susan explained that individuals who are mentally challenged can stay in school until they turn 21. But then what? Prospectus Berco provides training in life skills matched to an individual's ability. To encourage those individuals to live life to the fullest, they can also participate in a bevy of supervised activities. In the senior citizen area, elderly individuals who no longer want to engage in more active pursuits but still want to socialize, work on puzzles and crafts, watch TV, and chill out.

The agency operates 28 group homes, some rented and some owned. I have trouble keeping my own money pit looking spiffy and I can't imagine what it takes to keep several going, but they do it.

And then there's LifeSharing. What, I wondered, motivates an individual to reach out and share hearth and home with an intellectually challenged adult? Diana Whery, one such person, agreed to answer that question. Diana grew up around people with disabilities, intellectual and/or physical, and was comfortable with them. But she noticed that others were not. Diana said she wants individuals to understand that there are lessons to be learned from everyone. And what does she get in return? The woman who lives with her has adopted Diana and her family as her own. Amazing. Adorable. Those are the words Diana uses to describe her. She is, Diana says, part of the family.

I think I covered everything they do... did I mention the joy? In the cheerful workshop where workers forge friendships and look forward to the afternoon exercise session there is joy. In the sunny classrooms and senior center where staff and clients interact, sharing information and jokes, there is joy. In the LifeShare homes where individuals are welcomed with love, there is joy.

Dinner and Drinks

- 2 lbs skinless chicken pieces

Summer is just around the corner, and that means summertime entrees and beverages. Nobody wants to spend time in the kitchen when the weather is nice, so this month we're going to keep it simple. So grab a deck chair, light up the tiki torches, and treat yourself to these simple yet tasty treats on a warm summer evening. **Pineapple Chicken** Preheat the oven to 375F

Pineapple chicken

- 1/2 tsp paprika
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp pepper
- 1/4 tsp ground ginger

- I tsp dried rosemary

Place the chicken in a baking dish and pour the pineapple chunks over the chicken. In a small bowl, combine the rosemary, paprika, salt, pepper and ginger. Sprinkle this over the chicken

Bake covered for one hour or until the chicken is no longer pink inside. Serve plain or over rice.

Banana Parfait Dessert

- I jar caramel ice cream topping, (about 1-1/2 cups)

- I can (14 oz) unsweetened pineapple chunks, drained

- 2 tablespoons rum
- 1/4 teaspoon ground cinnamon
- 4 medium bananas, ripe but firm
- Vanilla ice cream



In a large skillet over medium-low heat, combine ice cream topping, rum, and cinnamon. Cut bananas in half lengthwise then cut in half again crosswise. Add the bananas to the caramel mixture; heat through. Spoon bananas into glasses; top each serving with a generous scoop of ice cream then spoon warm caramel-rum sauce over the ice cream.

Electric Lemonade

- 1-1/2 oz vodka
- 1/2 oz blue Curacao
- 2 oz sweet and sour mix
- 7-up or Sprite

Combine vodka, blue Curacao and sweet and sour mix in a shaker or blender for 15 seconds until well mixed. Pour into a large glass with ice, add Sprite and garnish with a lemon slice and a maraschino cherry.

Where the heck is Margaritaville? Shelter from the Storm, Costa Rica.






